What is the special event?	This event is usually celebrated in September around the world. It began as a joke between John Baur and Mark Summers in 1995 during a game of racquetball. They encouraged each other using pirate slang and had so much fun they decided the world needed 'Talk Like a Pirate Day'. In Australia we recognise this date as the major fundraiser for Childhood Cancer Support. It's a day all about dressing up and having fun while making a difference to the lives of childhood cancer families. We know that September is a busy month, but it is important to Keiki, as you will read below. To help you celebrate it we have chosen to recognise it in February.
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Why is it important to Keiki Early Learning?	20 years ago Sam and Angela began the Keiki journey at Mindarie Keys with their first service opening in 2003. One of their favourite fun and happy events was Talk like a Pirate Day. They loved reading pirate books, dressing up, talking like a pirate and singing pirate songs. Over the years, this tradition has continued at the services as Keiki has grown. Sam and Angela never want to lose this special part of Keiki – having fun and bringing joy.
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What are our expectations?	Talk like a Pirate Day is the day to bring the fun of pirates! Invite your children and staff to dress as pirates, research some pirate jokes and songs and get ready to share your 'arrrgggg's with each other.
